GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIR

As I am sure you may remember, there is always something happening in and around the Department of Nursing—and some things never change. However, the past year brought some very positive changes. Finally after 15 years, the Department of Nursing is located on the main campus. During summer 2003, we moved into the remodeled second floor of Devilbiss Science Hall (Now simply called Devilbiss Hall). All of the departmental offices and labs (practice, health assessment and multimedia viewing rooms) are located on this floor. Most of the nursing classes are also offered in this building. With the move, we were able to expand the lab space to accommodate the increasing class sizes. Being next door to the Henson Science Hall, where the other departments in the Henson School are housed, has helped us to be much more a part of the School and the University as a whole.

We were also excited in October when the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) and the Maryland Board of Nursing notified us that we had received full accreditation for five years. Our next visit will be in spring 2008. Adding to this accomplishment was the fact that two faculty members, Drs. Lisa Seldomridge and Karen Badros, were selected to be accreditation visitors by the CCNE. Both of them have been part of an accreditation team conducting an accreditation visit this year at other institutions.

We are doing our part to lessen the nursing shortage by continuing to have high enrollments in both our traditional and our second-degree programs. In fall 2003, 160

nursing students enrolled in junior/senior level courses. Fifty-nine students graduated in May 2004 and 100 percent of SU nursing graduates were employed in the area of their choice upon graduation. Enrollment in the master's program has been low for several years; however, we are seeing an upsurge in interest in the graduate program with increased enrollments for fall 2004.

As you will see in the "Faculty News" section, many of our faculty are very busy with research and publications while others are maintaining clinical practices in a variety of settings. The faculty membership has had few changes in the past few years. We were fortunate last August to hire Mary T. (Molly) Parsons, CRNP—a graduate of our second degree and master's program. Molly is teaching primarily in the pediatric undergraduate course and pediatric sections of the family nurse practitioner course. We have started discussions with Dr. Shane Neely-Smith, at the College of the Bahamas, to develop a transcultural nursing course experience/exchange. Dr. Neely-Smith came to SU to discuss this idea, which was conceived by Dr. Mary DeLashmutt.

And lastly, we are launching the first installment of what we hope will be a regular newsletter publication for our nursing alumni. Check out this first issue and feel free to send in any news or updates, either personally or professionally, so that we can include it in the next edition. SIM MAN Simulated Patient Now Available in Nursing Resources Lab

This summer the Nursing Department increased its number of males available in the department when it purchased "Sim Man," a universal patient simulator provided by Laerdal Medical Corporation. This manikin provides many learning opportunities that previously were not available on manikins that the department owned. Sim Man has physiologically correct carotid, femoral, brachial and radial pulses, a pre-programmed medical library of heart, lung, bowel and vocal sounds, ability to take blood pressures by palpation or auscultation with

the Korotkoff sounds synchronized with pulse, and an ECG library of over 2,500 cardiac rhythms that allow cardiac monitoring, defibrillation and external pacing.

In order to use this manikin, its potential two faculty members, Dr. Dorothea McDowell and Professor Peggy Mitchell, traveled to Texas in July for a two-day, intensive workshop. Use of the manikin will be integrated into several junior-level courses, including Adult Health I and II and Health Assessment.
