GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIR Jeffrey Willey, Ph.D., RN, CLS, CLNC, CNE

As we begin a new year, we often question what we have done and what is next to come. This is easily answered for the SU Department of Nursing as this past year has been an exciting time.

- □ SU nursing students have once again earned the top spot for all University System of Maryland institutions on the first-time pass rate for NCLEX. This consistent and impressive accolade is recognition for the hard work and effort that are put forth by our students, faculty and support staff.
- ☐ As health care continues to change, the curricula for nursing programs continue to challenge faculty to keep up with best-practice evidence and standards of care that are infused into all nursing courses. Although SU nursing faculty continue to do this in a seemingly effortless process, I can tell you that this requires major efforts behind the scenes. We also teach students who are increasingly diverse and programs must adjust accordingly.
- □ In April, the department's various programs (B.S., M.S., D.N.P. and post-graduate certificate program) will be reviewed for CCNE accreditation. Alumni, students and individuals from the community will be invited to provide comments regarding the nursing programs. In addition, individuals will be invited to meet with the accreditors to discuss our nursing programs as well. The visit will occur April 11-13. Maryland Board of Nursing representatives also will be here during the same time to review SU nursing programs.
- □ We are pleased to announce that Robin Hoffman has come on board as the new instructional designer for the department.

 Robin is no stranger to SU. He worked as a senior instructional designer in the University's Instructional Design and Delivery Office until he accepted a position at UMES to serve as the assistant vice president for academic innovation. He earned his bachelor's degree in English/communications from UMES, a master's degree in instructional media design from Wilkes

University, and he is currently working on his doctorate in education at Morgan State University. His dissertation is focusing on factors related to online student retention; he is slated to graduate this May. Robin came back to SU in his new role as of July 2017. He lives in Fruitland with his wife, Lillian. We also welcome three new full-time faculty to the department (see separate section).



- □ Important Milestone coming up ... In May of 2019, the Department of Nursing will mark the 40th anniversary of the first graduation of nursing students from Salisbury State College. An appropriate celebration will be planned. More to come in next issue!
- □ Lastly, BIG changes are coming to the Department of Nursing and SU. As of July 2018, SU is creating a new college the College of Health and Human Services. This college will house programs that are currently found in various existing schools within the University structure. Under this new college, there will be a School of Nursing, School of Social Work and School of Health Sciences. We will be known as the Salisbury University School of Nursing. This new structure will provide the nursing program with enhanced visibility as its own "school." Stay tuned ...

In closing, we are very excited about the future of the SU nursing program. As we move through the new year, we certainly are aware that these upcoming changes will provide both opportunities and challenges. GLOBAL STUDENT EXPERIENCE UPDATE

In January 2017, a group of 12 nursing students and two faculty traveled to Ecuador for a three-credit nursing course titled Cultural Considerations in Health and Wellness. Highlights of the trip included visits to local health care agencies, a national park (El Cajas), a hike in the Andes in Saraguro, a day trip to the ruins of Ingapirca, and tours of both Cuenca and Guayaquil. This trip is offered every other January and open to those who want to enhance their cultural competence while enjoying the spring-like climate of Ecuador at that time of year. It will be offered again in January 2019, led by Dr. Vonnie Brown. The trip is open to graduates, as well as current students, including a limited number of Honors pre-nursing students. In January 2018, Dr. Tina Brown Reid, along with Dr. Rebecca Anthony from Social Work Department, travelled with a group of 20 students from various disciplines – nursing, social work, respiratory therapy – to Cape Town, South Africa, from January 5-22. This four-credit interdisciplinary studies (IDIS) course integrates classroom and field instruction to introduce students to key concepts of global health in South Africa, the fundamental principles of South Africa's health care systems and apartheid. Students have the opportunity to engage in discussions with health care professionals, other professionals of various disciplines and patients. This experiential-learning program allows students to reflect on their experiences and observe in the field what they have learned in the classroom. Another trip is planned for January 2020.



GREETINGS FROM THE SECOND DEGREE & GRADUATE NURSING PROGRAM DIRECTOR

I am delighted to share the accomplishments of SU Graduate and Second Degree Nursing Program students in this inaugural column. Here's a snapshot of the events of 2017.

- ☐ Graduate Scholarship Day featuring two M.S. educator students was held in December 2017. Jenelle Davis-Jackson presented her project "Analysis of the Direct Admission Process at Children's National Health System: An Innovative Approach to Hospitalization." Debra Van Dyke also presented her project, "Creating an Educational Series for Patients Focusing on Discharge Readiness at University of Maryland Shore Behavioral Health."
- □ Educational Pathways The M.S. Nurse Educator Program curriculum has undergone considerable changes within the last 18 months, which were recently approved by the University System of Maryland and the Maryland Higher Education Commission. Changes include courses in curriculum design, assessment and evaluation, and two practicum experiences totaling 400 hours. Upon graduation, M.S. educator students are eligible to take the National League for Nursing Academic Educator certification exam and are well-positioned to enter doctoral study. This option is designed for those interested in teaching positions in academia, hospitals, and other health care settings. Scholarship support for Maryland residents is available through the Hal and Jo Cohen Graduate Nursing Fellowship (see right). Special thanks to Dr. Debra Webster for her exceptional work on this major redesign project.
- ☐ The M.S. Healthcare Leadership Program is back and ready for students! This 36-credit option prepares students for positions from traditional management/administrative careers to emerging leadership roles in quality, safety, Magnet coordination and provider practice management in a wide range of organizations, including inpatient, ambulatory, integrated systems and community-based. Graduates are well-prepared to enter Salisbury's post-M.S. to D.N.P. Leadership-focused Program.

- □ The **Doctor of Nursing Practice** program, begun in 2012, offers two entry-options to the D.N.P. an 80 credit option for those with a B.S. in nursing who wish to become family nurse practitioners and a post-master's entry option for those with an M.S. in nursing Post-M.S. to D.N.P. applicants may select a leadership concentration (38 credits) or family nurse practitioner concentration (68 credits). Applications are due March 1 for the fall 2018 start. Consider advancing your education at your alma mater! All graduate program options are offered in a distance-accessible format with limited campus-based experiences.
- ☐ Awards and Funding Opportunities Eight Salisbury University D.N.P. students have received the Hal and Jo Cohen Graduate Nursing Faculty Scholarship (GNF) funded by the Maryland Higher Education Commission. Breanna Sloan, Kristen Loetz Farrell, Terijean Rhoderick, Molly Dale, Amy Rothstein, Carrie Kellams, Lori Harvin and Margaret Persaud were awarded funding for the 2017-2018 academic year. Sloan, Farrell, Dale, Rothstein and Kellams are graduates of Salisbury's B.S. Nursing Program. Maryland residents who are current full-time or part-time graduate students enrolled at an eligible accredited Maryland postsecondary institution in a Master's of Science in Nursing (M.S.N., M.S.) Program, post-graduate certificate program in nursing education or doctoral (Ph.D., D.N.P., Ed.D.) program are eligible to apply. The GNF covers all tuition and mandatory fees for courses in the approved nursing plan of study at Maryland public or independent colleges and universities. All recipients must agree to a service obligation as a nurse faculty at a Maryland institution with nursing degree programs or within a hospital education department as a nursing professional development coordinator or hospital educator or in an approved educational role serving Maryland schools or hospitals. DEPARTMENT OF NURSING WINS TWO MHEC-NURSE SUPPORT II PROGRAM GRANTS

Drs. Debra Webster and Lisa Seldomridge were awarded \$1.978M to create a series of web-based toolkits with integrated Standardized Patient Experiences (SPEs) to enhance collaboration, conflict management and advocacy skills in nursing. In addition to being used with undergraduate nursing students, these toolkits will be available to partner hospitals for use in new graduate orientation/residency programs and ongoing staff development.

Toolkits include learner objectives, facilitation materials for educators, video vignettes enacted by standardized patients (SPs) demonstrating effective and ineffective communication techniques, as well as activities to encourage critique, practice and refinement of new skills. Scenarios enacted by SPs will feature several types of interactions, including nurse-patient/ family, nurse-

nurse or nurse-other health professional, and superior-subordinate. Drs. Katie Hinderer, Thea Winter, Judy Jarosinski, Robert Joyner and Professors Amanda Willey and Lorraine Henry are collaborators on this four-year project.

Drs. Lisa Seldomridge and Judy Jarosinski also received \$1.8 M to create the Maryland Nurse Educator Career Portal (E-CaP) a "one stop shop" website for nurses interested in educator positions. The website will provide: 1) an information section describing educational paths for a career as an educator in academic and practice settings and funding sources; 2) an image-building section with videos and narrated photo montages featuring current faculty who describe their career trajectories; and 3) a portal to connect nurses interested in part-time or full-time teaching jobs with schools and health care organizations having open positions. Dr. Kayna Freda and Dr. Jeffrey Willey are collaborators on this five-year project, in addition to Erin Silva and Brett Dobelstein from the Eastern Shore Regional GIS Cooperative and Drs. Louise Jenkins and Matt Rietschel from the University of Maryland School of Nursing.

SU NURSING PARTNERS WITH LA MERCED FOR OR/MISSION TRIP EXPERIENCE IN NICARAGUA

While attending a fundraiser in summer 2016 for La Merced Medical Mission, Dr. Mary DiBartolo of SU's Nursing Department and founding physician, Dr. Vincent Perrotta of Peninsula Plastic Surgery had a few moments to connect. Perrotta mentioned that although they have been doing these trips to Managua, Nicaragua, since 2007 and have taken a variety of healthcare providers, he asked about possibility of including SU nursing students interested in operating room on the upcoming January trip.

Three months later, DiBartolo presented this opportunity to junior/senior nursing students, and two were selected to participate in the January 2017 immersive OR experience. Juniors Alison Farmer and Kristen Murphy spent four full days assisting Perrotta and Florian Huber of Peninsula Orthopaedic Associates, gaining valuable clinical experience as the doctors treated patients with severe health conditions or injuries.

"The students got a front-row seat in the operating room," said DiBartolo, who accompanied them, "and we were in two public hospitals, where the poorest of the poor are treated." The health problems there are those not usually seen in the U.S., such very advanced breast cancer requiring significant reconstruction and untreated fractures and malunions that required extensive procedures. Students were able to scrub in and assist where appropriate; they also worked in the community-based medical clinic.

The trip was such a success, two students were invited to join the La Merced team for the January 2018 medical mission trip. Current junior Natalie Riden and senior Melissa Rolfes recently returned and reported another action-packed and life-changing experience, again assisting with plastics and

orthopedic procedures.

The La Merced Medical Mission was founded 10 years ago by St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church in Salisbury, in conjunction with a sister parish in Nicaragua as an independent nonprofit. "The presence of students and the opportunity to teach them invigorates the physicians," said Perrotta, board president. "It is a win-win. They provide critical support," including handling medical supplies and equipment while learning the nurse's role in the OR setting."

DiBartolo noted that the SU students were exposed to methods of care in "an environment lacking state-of-the-art technology and adequate funding. They saw first-hand the healthcare problems in a third-world nation." Students also enroll in a one-credit independent study where they not only summarize their experiences and observations, but reflect upon the socio-cultural experience overall. Both Perrotta and DiBartolo hope that they can continue this valuable partnership for years to come.




Sedonna Brown and Jennifer Hart both started in full-time tenure track positions this past fall of 2016.
