Dear Colleagues: Although we are four weeks from the start of classes, I know how much effort has gone into preparing for the upcoming academic year. I want to thank all of you again for your thoughtful planning and resilience in this truly difficult time.

Many of us feel most challenged by the uncertainty that COVID-19 has created. I appreciate your fortitude as we make detailed plans recognizing that we may need to change our plans as circumstances warrant.

Because of concerns regarding impacts of Tropical Storm Isaias, we are **rescheduling the Faculty Town Hall** scheduled for 8/4 **to Weds.**, **Aug. 5 at 7:00 pm**. An invitation and description of the event will be coming in an email from the Provost's Office later today.

## Good news to share:

- The United Nations Academic Impact and the Millennium Compact Network partner to provide the <u>Millennium Fellowship</u> 'a 10 session, semester-long leadership accelerator convening student leaders across universities to improve their student organizations, partnerships, and community impact.' More than 15,000 undergraduates from more than 1400 campuses worldwide applied to join the Millennium Class of 2020. Less than 10% were selected as Millennium Fellows including 13 students from Salisbury University! Each Millennium Fellow project focuses on one of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals and is designed to benefit the campus and/or greater Salisbury community. Please join me in congratulating Brian Polkinghorn (Conflict Analysis & Dispute Resolution and Executive Director, Bosserman Center), Brittany Foutz (CADR), Abey Adeoye (recent History alumnus), and others who supported our students in winning this recognition. Campuses and names of fellowship winners are listed on the website above.
- The College of Health and Human Services (CHHS) recently announced the creation of the <u>Center for Healthy Communities</u> which will benefit our local community through workforce development grants, professional continuing education, community service grants, and community-based learning. The Center, led by Teresa Simmons, will work on current CHHS initiatives, such as the School of Social Work's Behavioral Health Integration in Pediatric Primary Care (BHIPP) Program and the School of Nursing's Faculty Academy and Mentorship Initiative, and help other areas launch similar programs.
- Deneen Long-White (Community Health) and Teresa Simmons learned last week that they have won a major award from U.S. Department of Health & Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) to develop behavioral-health teams to support children whose parents are impacted by substance-abuse disorders. The total funding on this project is expected to be nearly \$2M. Congratulations Deneen and Teresa!
- Jill Caviglia-Harris (Economics and Environmental Studies) recently won a \$108,000 grant from Resources for the Future (RFF) and the National Aeronautics and Space

Administration (NASA). Her project team includes collaborators from NYU, San Diego State, University of Montana, NC State, and the New Zealand Forest Research Institute. They will evaluate the value and impact of satellite imagery in monitoring and enforcing deforestation limits in accordance with the Brazilian Forest Code. Congratulations, Jill and team!

- Speaking of external funding, thanks to all of you who have continued to work on proposals despite these challenging times. Thanks as well to our colleagues in the Office of Sponsored Programs for their expertise and commitment to supporting your work. FY20 (last academic year) was the highest for 'indirects' from grant and contract awards with more than \$568K earned that can be reinvested in research, graduate education, faculty development, and other programs.
- Shanetia Clark (Early and Elementary Education) has been named an editor of *Voices from the Middle*, a quarterly journal of the National Council of Teachers of English. This peer-reviewed journal offers original contributions providing innovative and practical ideas for classroom use that are rooted in the most current research.
- <u>SU was ranked tops</u> by the career platform Zippia as a best public college in Maryland for getting a job in 2020.
- Thanks to all of you who completed the Faculty Extra Instructional Productivity Survey – we landed well above 85% responding. The information you provided in the FEIP is very helpful in communicating the great work you do and the scope of faculty 'workload.'

**COVID-19 Information** on the <u>COVID-19 websites</u> is constantly being updated as is the Faculty Senate MyClasses Canvas Site. New info includes:

- SU has implemented an electronic COVID-19 self-screening process for all members of the campus community. Employees must use this self-screening process to assess their risk and record their status, any day that they are coming to campus. Employees are encouraged to complete the daily self-screening <u>online</u>. Soon, this process will be possible though SU Mobile, SU's iOS and Android app. See the email sent today from COVID Screening for more information.
- Late last week, the <u>USM stated that a negative COVID-19 test result</u> will be required for all students and System employees. Please monitor your email for more information on testing. While SU will offer free testing, those able to get tested in advance through their primary care providers or an <u>approved Maryland testing site</u> are encouraged to do so as soon as possible or within 14 days before returning to campus. The <u>Wicomico County</u> <u>Health Department</u> also is offering testing.
- Per attached guidance from the Maryland Secretary of Health, **Out-of-state travel by Maryland residents is strongly discouraged.** This includes personal travel. We are making plans for supporting **out-of-state students arriving from hot-spot states**. All students will be required to provide a negative test result before coming onto campus.
