Greetings, colleagues: Although Spring Break may have provided a small respite, I know that April is always a busy month at a time when our energy starts to flag (likely even more so after the last two tough years!). The scholar Mays Imad has written powerfully on trauma-informed teaching and faculty support and development. She quotes the Persian poet and Islamic scholar Rumi, "Friends, we are travelling together." And that we are. Thank you for your continued commitment and good work to meet the needs and goals of our students.

Enrollment: You may have seen the <u>article in the Washington Post yesterday</u> about university enrollment challenges, particularly at public comprehensives. My sincere thanks to all who continue to support our recruitment and retention efforts, including Admitted Students Day this Saturday (April 9th) and for our graduate and satellite programs. We're still slightly ahead in first-year student enrollment for fall, 2022 but need to continue to focus on retention (thanks for all your advising efforts) as well as transfer and graduate student enrollment.

Good news to share:

- Congratulations to Amit Poddar, Judy Billups, Aaron Johnson, Argha Sen, Crista Hughes and the entire MASMI team on a very successful National Shore Sales Challenge last week. Teams from 38 campuses in the U.S. and Canada competed in multiple competitions. The competition is fully funded by several sponsors ranging from Perdue Farms to Salesforce and is one of the largest in the country. A ton of work well done!
- The Department of Computer Science (with logistical support from Jathan Austin and Carvel LaCurts (Mathematics)) held the first-ever Eastern Shore High School Programming Contest last week. Congratulations on an exciting and well organized event!
- Mamma Mia! rang in a return to live musical theatre at SU last week. Congratulations to all the students, faculty and staff involved in this ambitious production and to Director Blake Harris.
- SU has a vibrant Americorps/Shorecorps Program which filled 187 spots in their 2021-2022 program. In addition to service to the community and the valuable work and learning experiences this program provides to members, SU Americorps/Shorecorps provided over \$220,000 in tuition benefits (most participants are full-time students in the Seidel School, CHHS, or Accounting program). Thanks to Sara Heim and Sandy Pope for this well run and high-impact program.
- Good news keeps coming in. So far this cycle, five SU students and recent alumni have won Fulbright Student Awards for the upcoming year. Thanks to Kristen Walton and her team in the in the Nationally Competitive Fellowships Office and all faculty who mentor these students and write letters of recommendation.
- This fall, at least six SU students will 'study away' through <u>National Student Exchange</u> at campuses in Alaska, Georgia, and Minnesota among others.
- April is National Poetry month. Take a break and check out the work of SU poetry students in the Poetry Walk along the north wall of the first floor of the GAC.
- Things have been busy at the Nabb Center which was recently approved to house the City of Salisbury's archives. Other recent projects include Enduring Connections which explores Delmarva's Black History (with a database of more than 100,000 records and walking tour of Salisbury's Black History). The Smithsonian is supporting the project by funding two in interns. Congratulations to Creston Long, Ian Post, and the entire Nabb Team on this great work.

- Congratulations to Jim Forte who was awarded with the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Maryland Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers.
- Last fall, more than 1,900 undergraduates participated in Gull Week! The Henson School recaptured the champion's crown with the largest percentage of majors participating (the Seidel School was a close second). Thanks to all students who participated, faculty who encouraged engagement, and Sarah Winger and the UARA team for another successful assessment of student learning outcomes. COVID-19: We are continuing to trend in the right direction! For the week ending 4/1/22, the weekly positivity rate at our Testing Center was 0 (N=528). In the past week, two Academic Affairs employees were reported as Not Cleared for a medical reason.

• The University Health Team has modified mask policy as follows: KN95/N95/KF94 masks will now only be required in instructional settings during instruction (except of instructors/

presenters who are at least 6 feet from others), on SU transportation, and in Campus and Student Health. Masks may be required during certain events (e.g., densely-populated activities at which appropriate physical distancing may not be possible).

- We encourage good mask etiquette of all (e.g., if others ask you to wear a mask, please do).
- KN95 masks continue to be available at the GSU information desk.
- We are communicating with the USM regarding what public health policies and infrastructure will be in place next academic year.
- We live in stressful times. Please encourage your students to seek any help they may need through <u>SU's Counseling Center</u> which offers 24/7 telehealth support through <u>timelycare</u>. Employee support is available through the USM's Employee Assistance Program <u>ComPsych</u>. If you haven't already done so, consider setting-up an account to learn about services available.
