Training, Opportunities, Resources and Reminders

- The Summer Writing Program (SWP) is back for 2022! This program is designed to support faculty with strategies and opportunities for goal setting, efficient writing, constructive feedback, and accountability. Facilitated faculty cohorts will provide moral support and share expertise and advice as they complete the National Center for Faculty Development & Diversity's (NCFDD) 14-Day Writing Challenge; will meet in weekly accountability sessions; and complete an agreed-upon deliverable. The program targets pre-tenure faculty, but tenured faculty are welcome to apply as well. SWP alumni are welcome to participate but will not be eligible for a stipend. Deadline is 6/17/22. You'll have the following options: watch the video to retain the recording in Panopto; download the video for safekeeping; or confirm the video can be deleted.
