Lawanda thanked Dr. Southerland for his leadership and everyone for their efforts while sharing a document of the division-wide SWOT analysis. A SWOT was conducted on every department within Student Affairs, in six phases. The committee talked to each department, gathering goals for each unit, which have been compiled for the division. The executive summary outlines the actions taken by the committee, the timeline, as well as an inspirational video by Dr. Foust to indicate the significance of the process.
55 56 57 58 59		The SWOT analysis was conducted throughout July and August, was compiled and returned to the individual units for approval and confirmation that everything was captured. Lawanda noted the SPA committee can take the data and translate to divisional goals and those of the individual units. Some goals align with the university plan and others are unique to the unit and that is "okay."
60 61 62 63 64 65	7.	Dr. Southerland presented on "Student Affairs at Salisbury: A Framework for Assessment," most of which can be found on the Student Affairs website. He highlighted what Student Affairs assessment means: being intentional, consistent, methodical, to understand the impact the Student Affairs has on student learning. The presentation also included progress on the nine SA Assessment Strategy areas. For example:

73 74 75 76 77		The committee will advise the university with these strategies; in addition to assisting staff and unit directors with refining their assessment efforts. Dr. Southerland recently implemented Assessment Consultation office hours to assist and
78 79		support unit-level assessment efforts.
80 81 82		Seth asked how we measure student learning? Is it self-reported? CSA struggles with identifying that evidence. Dr. Southerland assured should not be afraid to develop self-reporting data.
83 84 85		Dr. Dockins-Mills asked if this measure should be built into the student satisfaction surveys? Dr. Southerland noted to never miss an opportunity to ask students what they have learned.
86 87		Dr. Winger reflected on the alignment of what the outcomes will be to tweak the data, which is definitely worth the effort. This becomes even more important as the budget restrictions come

88	down the line, to target the particular tools to retrieve the data. She also mentioned to be
89	mindful of over surveying the students, make changes to be locations and times.

91	Dr. Southerland pointed out the 2020-201 Committee Agenda and the timeframes. The
92	measurement by June 30 <sup>th</sup> is to have fifty percent or more of the units DMIs developed and to
93	explore documented evidence of professional development.

95	Dr. Southerland talked about the SA C.A.U.S.E. Model:
96	Collect the data
97	• Analyze the data; think about the data and what they mean for policy and practice; talk

103	Again, assessment is useful to show the impact on student learning.
